Summer Sanctification – Cognitive Dissonance By: Pastor Bruce Grentz

With August upon us, the start of school isn't far away. Where do the summers go? When I was a kid they seemed like forever but now, it's like a day or two. Thinking of school, I wanted to continue with another article on Summer Sanctification and cognitive dissonance.

You might be wondering what is cognitive dissonance? And also, you might be wondering how does it relate to our sanctification or becoming like Christ?

First, let me address cognitive dissonance. From <u>www.sciencedirect.com</u>, "Cognitive dissonance theory postulates that an **underlying psychological tension is created when an individual's behavior is inconsistent with his or her thoughts and beliefs**. This underlying tension then motivates an individual to make an attitude change that would produce consistency between thoughts and behaviors."

But how does the idea of cognitive dissonance relate to our sanctification, our becoming like Christ? Think about the definition of cognitive dissonance and then think of Jesus. Did He suffer intellectual and emotional tension because his thoughts and beliefs were inconsistent or better put incongruent with his actions? No, not at all. The writer of Hebrews tells us that in Jesus we have a **high priest who empathizes with our weaknesses because he was tempted as we are yet he did not sin**. (Hebrews 4:15) Temptations came at him, as they do us, yet his actions never evidenced a disagreement with his beliefs.

For us, not so much. If Sanctification is God conforming us to the image of His Son, Jesus, then, as we become more like Him, our actions and beliefs will become increasingly congruent. But for any number of our heroes of the faith, this incongruence between their beliefs and actions has overwhelmed them at times. Think of King David who knew the Law of God. He had to know the 5th and 6th commandments – thou shalt not murder and thou shalt not commit adultery. Yet he broke both of them

Paul, also, had a similar disconnect between his beliefs and his actions. We read in Romans 7:16, 18-19, "¹⁶ And if I do what I do not want to do, I agree that the law is good.....For I know that good itself does not dwell in me, that is, in my sinful nature.^[C] For I have the desire to do what is good, but I cannot carry it out. ¹⁹ For I do not do the good I want to do, but the evil I do not want to do—this I keep on doing." Paul admits that the law is good but he can't keep it. In fact, he admits he continues to do what he doesn't want to do and winds up in verse 24 in despair saying, "What a wretched man I am! Who will rescue me from this body that is subject to death? ²⁵ Thanks be to God, who delivers me through Jesus Christ our Lord!"

So, how do our beliefs and actions become congruent? By continuing to look at Jesus in His Word and the sacraments. In a way, it's counter-intuitive to look to Jesus to become like Him because when we look at him, we see how we aren't like him. But under the New Covenant, as Paul tells us in 2 Corinthians 3:18, "And we all, who with unveiled faces contemplate, behold, look, see, reflect the Lord's glory, are being transformed into his image with ever-increasing glory, which comes from the Lord, who is the Spirit."

So, keep looking to Jesus. If we are being transformed into his image by the Spirit of God, and we are, then we will not only have the mind of Christ, (1 Corinthians 2:16) but also, act like him as well (Acts 10:38).

I want to start off by saying that I remain encouraged and have faith in God's plan for Our Savior's Lutheran Church.

In previous Newsletter articles I have listed all or part of our Mission Statement, as I feel it defines who we are as a church and that it also gives us a common purpose to unify around, despite our differences and despite our imperfections. This month I will again list our Mission Statement, and then focus in on one part of it.

"Our Savior's Lutheran Church is a scripture based, welcoming fellowship of believers who proclaim the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, and who, through our support of and connecting with each other, the local community, and children of God everywhere, strive to *love Christ and all others.*"

I would like to focus on what it means to be a "**welcoming fellowship of believers.**"

Our congregation should be our extended family, and our church a place where we feel loved, and cared for, a welcoming place where we can find support and respect; where we can get away from the hustle and bustle of life and escape the political nature of this world. It should also be a place where we welcome strangers with open hearts, where they can feel the love of our Lord surrounding them.

As a fellowship of believers, we should appreciate our differences. We should understand that our relationship with our God is a walk of faith, and that each of us may be at a different point on that walk of faith. At any time, some may be supporters and connecters and proclaimers of the Gospel, and some may need to be supported and connected with and to hear God's Word proclaimed. Some may need to come to church as a refuge from daily life, and some may need to be actively engaged in ministry. Some may be somewhere in between or a combination of all the above. We should recognize our different needs and experiences as a strength; and embrace our diversity and strive to always be kind, compassionate, and empathetic to one another.

As your elected representatives, I believe your Council has a responsibility to create an environment where we can all be that welcoming fellowship of believers. We are working hard, if imperfectly, to accomplish that. We had a special Council meeting in June in addition to our regular monthly meeting, and we have another special meeting in July, a month in which we traditionally take a break for the summer. Josh Ashcraft was elected to fill the vacancy for the position that runs through the end of 2023, and we hope at the special meeting on July 26th to get the majority vote of Council members

required to fill the vacancy for the position that runs through the end of 2024. Adam Nourse is heading up the Small Focus Groups to review duties and responsibilities of roles in our church, for which 24 members of our congregation volunteered; and we are continuing to work, with the LCMC pastors as a resource, to resolve issues and get things back on track so we can **truly and undistractedly** be that welcoming fellowship of believers and serve our awesome God.

As always, I ask for your prayers for myself and the rest of the Council team, that we may provide the leadership that you all deserve. Together we are OSLC Strong!

The *ReClaim Hymnal* was commissioned by the LCMC (Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ) and the NALC (North American Lutheran Church), and the OSLC Worship & Music Ministry has discussed supplementing our current printed resources with a few Accompaniment and Pew Editions of the ReClaim. Pastor Bruce, Council Liaison Alan Huss and Worship & Music Ministry member Don McFarland will be sharing information in more detail with the council regarding this topic, and the Worship & Music Ministry will wait to receive feedback from the council and the congregation before moving forward on this matter to possibly supplement our printed resources. If approved, pew editions would be available for purchase for \$23 each and accompaniment editions would be available for \$52 each with the opportunity to dedicate each hymnal to the OSLC congregation on behalf of a loved one (the first Accompaniment Edition of the ReClaim Hymnal was gifted to OSLC in loving memory of Gary Courtney). Please note that we do not intend to abandon the LBW (green) hymnal as a resource for our Worship Services, and we deeply appreciate all those who have submitted request lists from the LBW and the "Black Book". Your request lists are respectfully, prayerfully, and lovingly considered each and every week.

We are in the early stage of consideration regarding this matter, and we are open to feedback from all members of the congregation. We want to hear from you. We know these songs and hymns mean a lot to so many of you, and we want to be respectful of everyone's ideas, thoughts, and feelings. Please keep sharing your song requests with us, and we will try our best to accommodate your requests and to include your suggestions. If you would like to know more about the *ReClaim Hymnal*, you can visit Sola Publishing at www.solapublishing.com (type "ReClaim Hymnal" in the search box). There are four different books in the *ReClaim* series, and they are as follows: the

Introductory Edition (an abridged version of the *ReClaim Hymnal*), Pew Version (the unabridged hymnal in a hard back cover), Spiral Bound (the unabridged hymnal for accompanists) and *ReClaiming the Lutheran Liturgical Heritage* by Oliver K. Olson.

Our congregation continues offering praise and worship to the Lord every Sunday at 9:30 (with mostly traditional hymns and Via de Cristo songs and one Christian radio song from time to time) and at 11:30 (with songs from contemporary Christian radio such as K-LOVE and The Message). August is here. The 2nd Sunday Offering for August will go to Open Hands Food Pantry. There is also a basket in the narthex for food donations.


