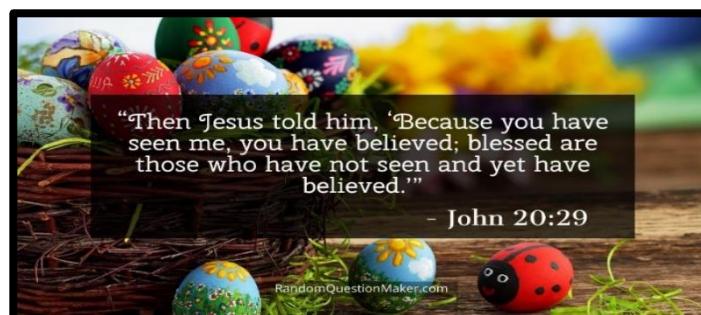
While I have just about the least amount of music ability any human can have – as I hit the road again singing on my return east. I have a plan to see some old friends on the way.

I am excited to see the momentum building toward our 70th Anniversary celebration. It is indeed inspiring to think that Our Savior's has been a part of the Roy community for 70 years, and to see how strong we are as we are preparing to begin the next chapter in our service to our awesome God!

So, what is happening. I'll let the 70th Anniversary Celebration team go more into all those details, but I would like to highlight a few. Several entries have been submitted for the new stain glass window design, and by the time you read this newsletter, the winning design may have already been selected. Also, Council approved upgrading the two bathrooms off the kitchen in the Fellowship Hall so they will be ready for the celebration weekend at the end of August, and the Golf for the Son Committee is already planning for the annual fundraiser golf tournament and planning ways to make it more inclusive and friendly for all.

But just as exciting to me as all the cool events and activities that are being planned are the circumstances and timing of this special anniversary. This 70-year period is concluding much the same way as it began so many years ago, with a group of faithful believers coming together to serve our awesome GOD. In 1956 our founding members planted the seed of our church and did whatever was needed to nurture and care for it and to help it grow. It must have seemed a little daunting and scary for them, not knowing where it would lead, but still trusting fully in GOD's plan. And 70 years later, a group of faithful believers have been and are coming together to serve our awesome GOD, again stepping up and doing whatever is needed to nurture and care for our church and to help it grow.

While it may not be fair to compare our circumstances with those of our founding members, being without a pastor is also a little daunting and scary and requires fully trusting in GOD's plan. But look at how we have been able to care for our church and keep it vibrant for those two years that we were without a pastor. We have strong Council leadership, and we now have Pastor Craig as our interim pastor under a truly unique arrangement, which means that the terms of our transition are changing a bit. We are no longer just "sustaining" our church while seeking a new shepherd for our flock, but we are now entering a true period of transition as we try to understand what GOD has planned next for His church here in Roy, Utah. The reality of pastor availability may mean that we need to be open to different models for our next called pastor, and that our members may need to serve in roles and in ways that are new and different from in the past. Pastor Craig has already started recruiting members to assist him during Worship Services, and he is also actively working to develop additional Lay Ministers to serve our church. We need to be patient and understanding as these and other changes are implemented.

To be clear, a period of transition can be a challenging time; and no doubt, change can be difficult and there may be some growing pains. However, sometimes change is required for growth, and being able to adapt to a changing environment is a sign of true faith. That seed of a church that was planted 70 years ago has grown into something truly special, but it still requires love and care to preserve it and for it to grow even stronger. So, let us continue to move forward together in faith, with no personal agenda, no preconceived notions, and no preset expectations. Let us follow our LORD with open hearts and open minds and open eyes, being open to whatever GOD has planned so we can experience the full wonder of that plan. And wherever our LORD leads, let us follow together as a united church family.

**TOGETHER WE ARE OSLC STRONG - 70 YEARS STRONG & GROWING STRONGER;** strong to praise and worship and serve our awesome GOD. We are empowered not just in the confines of our church but also empowered to go out into our daily lives to spread the Good News and to be players on CHRIST's Team!

**Monthly Devotional

This month I want to write about the resurrection of Jesus Christ, the miracle that changed everything for all of us. We now know that death is not the end, love is so much stronger than hate, and God's promises are trustworthy.

The New Testament presents the resurrection as a real, bodily event. Both women and men saw the risen Lord, touched Him, talked with Him and later even met Him again after He ascended. The empty tomb and the testimony of eyewitnesses are the historical anchors of our Christian claim that Jesus rose from the dead.

All of this validates Jesus's identity and messages. If Jesus rose, then His claims about being God's Son, about God's kingdom, and the truth about His forgiveness and the new life are vindicated. This defeats the power of sin and death. Paul writes that "Christ's resurrection is the first fruits of those who have died", (1 Corinthians 15:20-23) a promise that death will not have the final word. Because He rose, we can have hope beyond the grave.

This changes how we live now. Resurrection is not only a future hope but our present reality. To be united with the risen Christ means living in a newness of life: Loving our enemies, forgiving, serving the poor, and walking in the righteousness because we are transformed by grace. (Romans 6:4)

Our everyday faith shows us there is hope in suffering, that the resurrection shows us how to endure pain and loss. Suffering is neither meaningless nor final. Just as Jesus passed through the suffering of His resurrection, God can bring redemptive purposes

from our trials. Don't get me wrong, this does in no way minimize pain, but it places pain within a larger, more meaningful story.

We all have confidence in God's promises. If God raised Jesus from the dead, we can trust all the rest of His promises: that He is with us, that He will work all things for good for those who love Him. And that justice and mercy ultimately prevail. This trust should shape our decisions, our generosity, and our courage to live though and with God every day!

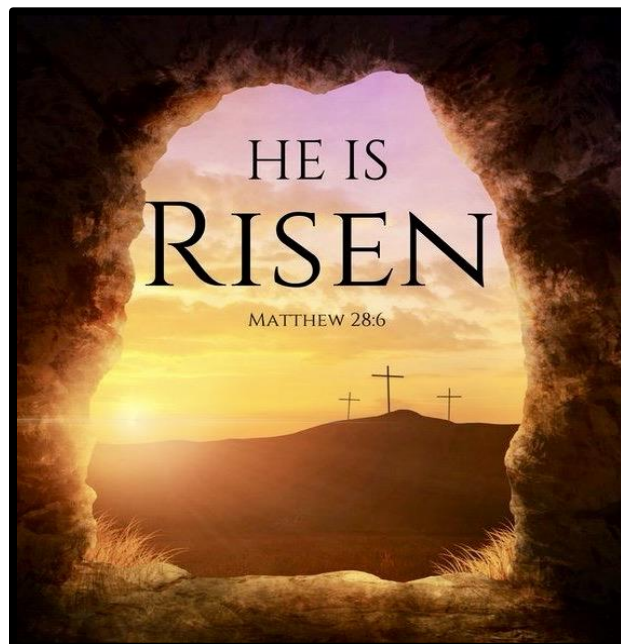
In writing this article on the resurrection, it has brought both hope and tears to my eyes over our sister in Christ Bobbi's passing, so I will leave you all with this short poem by an unknown author:

“When my friend was laid to rest in flame,  
I wept and whispered prayers in God's name.  
The earth seemed cold, the sky was gray,  
And hope felt buried within the clay.

But then I heard the Savior's word:  
“I am the life”, my heart was stirred.

For graves are not the final door,

Our Holy Week services will take on a fresh look this year, and we hope you'll join us as we walk through this sacred season together. Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services will begin at 7:00 p.m. Our Easter celebration will start at 9:30 a.m. with our traditional opening song, "He's Alive."

Holy Week invites us not only to remember events from long ago, but to enter them again with open hearts—allowing God to shape us, strengthen us, and lead us into the fullness of life. This week invites us to slow down, pay attention, and enter once more into the story at the heart of our faith. These days are more than a series of services—they are a shared pilgrimage through the life, love, sacrifice, and victory of Jesus Christ. Each moment carries its own meaning and its own invitation to experience God's grace in a deeper way.

The reflections below are offered as companions for the journey.

**Maundy Thursday — A Command to Love**

On Maundy Thursday, we remember the night Jesus gathered with His disciples for the Last Supper. In washing their feet, He showed that true discipleship is rooted in humility and service. In giving the new commandment—to love one another as He has loved us—He revealed the heart of Christian community. This night calls us to reflect on how we embody Christ's compassion, grace, and self-giving love in our daily lives.

**Good Friday — The Depth of God's Love**

Good Friday brings us to the foot of the cross. It is a solemn day, yet not a day without hope. As we remember Jesus' suffering and death, we face the reality of sin and the immeasurable love that led Him to give His life for the world. Good Friday invites us to pause, to grieve, and to recognize the cost of redemption. Even in the shadows of this day, God is already at work preparing the dawn of new life.

**Easter Sunday — "He's Alive"**

Easter morning breaks open with joy. The tomb is empty, the stone is rolled away, and Christ is risen. In the resurrection, God proclaims victory over death and offers the promise of new life to all who believe. Easter is a celebration of hope, renewal, and the assurance that God's love has the final word. As we gather to proclaim, "Christ is Risen," we remember that the story does not end in sorrow but in triumph.

As we walk through these sacred days together, may our hearts be open to the transforming power of Christ's love.

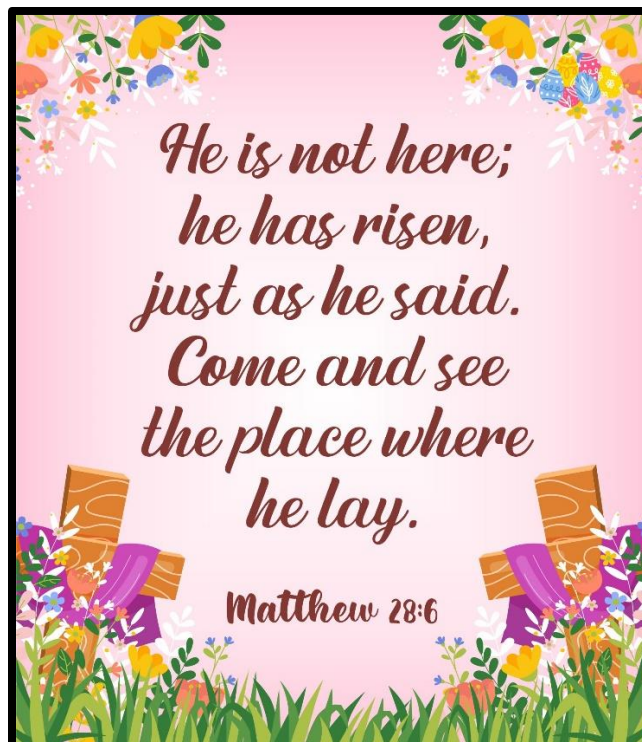
